Why Senior Transportation is Important

 "If older adults are going to stay in their own home, transportation they can access must be in place." [NCST, Transportation: The Silent Need, 2009]

AARP (2013):

- Older adults make up an increasing share of the nation's travel although older and retired people travel less
- Older men are more mobile than older women but the gap is narrowing

Eldercare Locator (2013):

 Transportation is the #1 reason older adults and caregivers call

"Giving up the keys" has a profound impact

- The number of older non-drivers is growing
- Older Adult non-drivers make 15% fewer trips to doctor
- But. . .59% fewer shopping or restaurant outings and 65% fewer trips for social, family, religious, and other life-enhancing purposes
- Caregivers time off of work
- Higher healthcare costs

Senior Transportation and Livable Communities go hand in hand

- Requires a coordinated, community approach that addresses the mobility needs of pedestrians, drivers and transit users
- Includes walkable streets, safe roads and flexible, customer-focused transportation services
- One-size does not fit all solutions are community based

Linkages/Making it Work

Mobility Management/Travel Counseling; Planning and Coordination; Transitions; Travel Training; One-Call/One-Click

Volunteer Transportation

- Key elements: passengers, vehicles, drivers, infrastructure
 - Liability Risk*
 - What need will the program fill? How recruit volunteers and passengers?
 - Volunteers may drive their own vehicles or agency vehicles
 - Riders may be assigned drivers or recruit their friends or neighbors to drive

- Drivers
- Passenger Assistants:
 - Knoxville-Knox County (TN)CAC
 - JFCS of Minneapolis (MN)
- Trainers
- Recruiters
- Travel Coaches:
 - Greater Lynn (MA) Senior Services

Mobility Management

- Helps people make informed choices about transportation
 - Need to identify all community transportation options ("1-call/1-click")
 - Connects people to rides
- Identifies gaps in transportation options
- Facilitates connections between programs

- Transit must be effectively used ~ may include Travel Training
- Reframes the transportation question and helps people take control of their destinations
- New ideas: Volunteer coaches/counselors; time banking partnership with dialysis centers

Mobility Management/Travel Counseling: Models & Innovations

- Volunteer Travel Coaches & Community Kiosks
 - ~ Greater Lynn Senior Services, Lynn, MA
- Transitions from Driving
 - ~ Mid-East Area Agency on Aging, Franklin County, MO
- Transportation for Dialysis Patients
 - ~ Dane County Department of Human Services, Madison, WI
- Connect-A-Ride; Travel Training for Older Workers
 - ~ Jewish Council for the Aging, Montgomery County, MD

Transportation Coordination

- Coordinated transit-human services planning
 - Get involved
 - Older riders & family caregivers should play a meaningful role
- Coordination between programs:
 - Transit/paratransit and human services transportation partnerships
 - Shared vehicle programs

- Transportation programs that serve older adults, children, people with physical and/or developmental disabilities
- Coordination across county or other boundaries, regional programs
 - Cost-saving, increase
 efficiency, improve ridership
 - Coordinate transit systems
 - May also coordinate other transportation services
- Voucher Programs

Transportation Funding is a Patchwork

- Federal MAP-21: Consolidates 5310 & New Freedom
 - ✓ FY13: \$254.8M; FY14: \$258.3M
 - ✓ Funding formula 60% to urban areas >200,000 population ("designated recipients"); 40% to States for small urban and rural areas
 - ✓ Subrecipients: State or local government, nonprofits, public transit
 - ✓ Improve access, decrease reliance on paratransit, develop alternatives
- Older Americans Act
- State and Local Funds
- Private Pay

Final Thoughts....

- Addressing the mobility needs of seniors is more complex than considering chronological age alone
- One size does not fit all
- Consider community assets
- Identify concerns, challenges
- Involve the community, current riders and potential users
- Be both person-centered and community-centered
- Choose an integrated model that offers options and choices

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
